


#### Art

Term 3 will see our Year 11 students embark on their final set of mock exams. These commence on Monday 24th February, with the final mock exam on Wednesday 5th March. These exams will help students get in the right mindset for their GCSE exams, as well as providing an opportunity to practice structured revision outside of the classroom. It also gives teaching staff the opportunity to spot errors and gaps in knowledge, which then underpins the teaching and feedback in future lessons. We wish our Year 11 students the very best of luck with these exams.

Thursday 6th February, we welcome Driver Hire into DCA, who will offer our Year 11 students a unique opportunity to enhance their skills with a mock interview day. The purpose of this event is to provide Year 11 students with a valuable opportunity to experience a professional interview setting, develop their confidence, and receive constructive feedback on their interview and CV. Each student will have a one-to-one, 20-minute interview with a representative from Driver Hire. The expectation for students is to wear smart/business attire, but normal school uniform can be worn if they choose to.

All of our Year 11 cohort are now getting excited by the prospect of applying to different colleges, with some students having interviews and receiving conditional offers. If any Year 11 student has an interview during school time, please can evidence be taken to our office staff on reception so this can be photocopied and authorised officially. Many students have received their first careers interview with our careers advisor, Karen Hodgson. We will continue to work through the list of students who are yet to have this meeting yet. During our PDS sessions, we have also continued to welcome external speakers in to the academy, to provide as much information and support as possible. During Term 3, we have welcomed Shipley College to talk about their apprenticeships. As well as Bradford University, to talk to students about how students can enhance their chances of attending university during Year and throughout college.

Term 4 has seen our Year 11 students demonstrate a high level of selfdetermination to complete their final mock exams in preparation for their actual GCSEs. The entire cohort have shown integrity in every exam and the external invigilators have commented on how mature and focussed the cohort has been throughout the fortnight. It is important to note that any student who is feeling anxious due to their mock results or getting into college, understands that there are staff at DCA who they can talk to. All students have a close relationship with form tutors. Year 11 students can speak to the Assistant Head of Year 11, Miss Kausur or Head of Year 11, Mr Lafferty. Referrals can be made to our academy counsellor Kim Morley for any student who requires this service.

Our Year 11 students have been working hard in their daily morning mastery and study prep session. We encourage all families to speak to their children about revision and to encourage a well-balanced approach outside school hours in the build-up to the GCSEs. We have done work on creating a sensible revision plan and recommend students accessing the revision section on the DCA website. Year 11 students are encouraged to use flash cards, LCWC and accessing past papers with mark schemes to practice exam technique. The GCSE exams begin on the week commencing Monday 12th May 2025 and finish at the end of the week commencing Monday 16th June 2025. Please ensure attendance and punctuality is impeccable throughout these dates and support our Year 11

students being on time for all exams at this crucial stage in their educational journey. A personalised GCSE exam timetable will be provided to all our students.

Excitement is building throughout the cohort about the Year 11 Prom. A letter has already been sent out to families, and we are pleased to confirm that the Year 11 Prom will take place on Friday 4th July 2025 at The White Abbey Ballroom, BD8 7RR. The subsidised cost per student is £28 and payment can be made via Parent Pay, with the link being communicated in the Prom letter that was sent out in March. The final date for payment is Wednesday 4th June.



Term 4 also saw our Year 11 students gain some valuable experience in mock interview technique with Driver Hire. Driver Hire offered our Year 11 students a unique opportunity to enhance their skills with a mock interview day, where Year 11 students gained valuable experience in a professional interview setting. 

## MyChildAtSchool (MCAS)

What is MyChildAtSchool?

MyChildAtSchool is an online portal that enables parents to view their child's performance at school in real time via any modern web browser (e.g. Edge, Firefox, Chrome, Safari etc.) and for today's busy parents, an app (for android or ios) which offers the same features.

Anytime access to Attendance, Behaviour, Assessment and student reports, letters or important documents. Student timetables alongside the school calendar and fully customisable Exam Timetables and results pages mean schools can keep parents fully informed electronically.

Communication through Push Notification (for the App), Announcements and important documents as well as enabling parent messaging to the school are all included features.

All communications to parents is now through the MCAS app rather than by text. If you haven't signed up yet, download the app from App store for apple mobile phones or Play Store for Android phones. Once you have downloaded the app, request a password reset and then you will have access to attendance, timetable, appreciation / behaviour data as well as cycle reports and exam timetables for GCSE and cycle 3 assessments. ## From West Yorkshire Police

Dear Parent/Guardian

We know that for a range of reasons, some children are regularly using vapes or at risk of trying a vape for the first time, some as young as 7 years old.

While vaping is currently viewed as a way for adults to cut down on cigarette smoking, buying or selling vapes to children under the age of 18 is illegal.

A lot of young people use vapes because of their popularity. It's easy for them to buy vapes online, in local shops and through friends or social media, however, many of the vapes targeted at children not only have high levels of nicotine, making them very addictive, they often contain illegal drugs or chemicals.

Some of these vapes are so strong that for some children, just taking one puff is causing them to become very unwell with some children requiring hospitalisation. This is a worrying trend, and we would like to ask for your help in raising awareness of the risks and sharing some safeguarding advice with your children;

- If they don't vape do not start
- If they do vape, try cutting down with the aim of trying to stop
- You do not know what is in a vape so using one is risky behaviour
- Do not use a vape which claims to have THC, cannabis, spice or any other illegal drug content. These can cause children to become very unwell, very quickly.
- If a child feels unwell after using a vape, tell a trusted adult immediately and seek medical advice. If a vape makes a child feel unwell it is likely to contain an illegal product.

If you are worried about your child's use of vapes, seek the advice of a health practitioner or your GP.

West Yorkshire Police's aim is to keep children safe and reduce the risk of any further hospitalisations or serious side effects from using illegal vapes.

West Yorkshire Police is working closely with schools across West Yorkshire to safeguard young people by raising awareness of the dangers linked to these vapes. # HOW TO SPOT ILLEGAL WEST TO SPOT TO SP

- 1. TANK SIZE: Anything over 2ml liquid.
- STRENGTH: More than 20mg/ml or 2% nicotine concentration.
- INFORMATION: The packaging should list the nicotine strength, puff count, ingredients, batch number and details of the manufacturer.
- HEALTH WARNING: Compliant vapes carry a health warning written in bold capital letters.
- 5. CERTIFICATIONS: Legal vapes carry these certification logos: UK (C)
